It's hard to find the best content online. Save yourself the search. Use Timeline and get context relevant, expert curated content instantly at the push of a button.


Our Sketches




In this part of the assignment each team member individually sketched out ideas as to what each of our 3 tasks would look like. This meant sketching ideas for how someone would view a timeline that offers context for a topic they're reading about, find timelines for topics they're interested in, and share their expertise by making their own timelines.

Our resulting sketches imagined different kinds of timeline generating buttons that sit in different places for users to use while browsing, different types and orientations of search bars, different layouts and views for results, and different mechanisms that allow you to put together articles in your own timeline.

Upon completion of the sketches we pieced together our favorite realizations of each task from our sketches into two unique storyboards pictured below:







Our Storyboard:

The storyboard we decided to reference for our paper prototype took the best pieces from both of our storyboarded sketches which is described below and broken down by task:

Task 1: View a timeline that gives context to a topic you're reading about

For this task we depicted a circular button that sits at the bottom right corner of a user's browser (overlayed on top of their content at all times) and opens a new tab with the top three selected timelines upon being clicked.

We liked this implementation because it didn't contain any menu's the user needed to press and it put the button in an always present and easy to click position. Other implementations we messed around with involved a pop-up menu triggered by the the button that users could use to pick from a selection of timelines but we thought this was adding an unnecessary step for users - better to just give them a few options without question in the new tab.

<u>Task 2:</u> Discover timelines for topics you're interested in

For this task we settled on a main search page with a search bar in the top right corner and results and preview frames below.

We liked this idea because it gave users immediate results without being moved to a new page and provided them a quick way of sampling a timeline before they chose to view it.

Task 3: Share your own expertise by making your own timeline

For this task we settled on a creation page that allows users to drag and drop urls into an outlined space in order to generate new entries in their timeline.

We settled on this idea because drag and drop seems like a natural function to perform that most people have experience with.


Overall: We tried to go with a user flow that made the user to perform the least amount of steps possible in order to get what they wanted. We wanted an easy to press always present timeline button. We wanted an easy to read, informative timeline layout. And


lastly, we wanted a simple mechanism people could pick up with ease for building new timelines.

Our Prototype and Implementation

Here we describe our paper prototype implementation of the storyboard described above.


The Timeline Button







To bring our timeline button to life we constructed a paper frame that served as a browser window and allowed users to "scroll" through a selection of paper news articles while keeping a timeline button always present at the bottom right corner. If the user "pressed" the timeline button the computer replaced the 'browser window' with a


timeline for that article. If the user tapped any of the "..." markers on the bottom of an entry the computer placed a relevant paper cutout summary underneath the given article. If the user clicked the actual entry the computer would swap the timeline with a paper copy of the referenced article.



Searching For a Timeline









In creating a working version of our search page we simply cut a space in the search


bar where users inserted one of two test topics (dogs or cats) which would result in the computer placing a list of results in the space labelled timelines. If the user then tapped a timeline the computer would lay down a preview of that timeline in the section labelled previews.

Creating a Timeline










For the create your own timeline feature of our prototype we provided the user with 3 fake urls that they could place on a timeline template equipped with a dotted line version of a timeline entry that says "drag and drop." Upon the user doing this the computer

pushed the drag and drop box down and put in it's place a new timeline entry for the provided url.



Overview of Prototype

Our Method:

Our Participants

We interviewed two undergrads and a PHD student. We chose these people as part of a demographic that frequently requires to do scholarly research and quickly learn about new topics.

<u>Lauren</u>- An undeclared Sophomore student athlete on the Softball team who counsels at Shipwreck in her spare time.

<u>Patrick-</u> A Sophomore with a strong business history majoring in Computer Science.

Jafar- A 4th year Phd. math student from Azerbaijan studying probability.

Environment

Testing was conducted in a conference room in the Lathrop Tech Lounge.

Tasks

Each subject tried out all 3 of our tasks:

- 1. View a timeline that gives context to a topic you're reading about
- 2. Discover timelines for topics you're interested in
- 3. Share your expertise by creating your own timeline

Procedure

After agreeing to test our prototype, subjects were taken to our conference room in the back of the Tech Lounge. Andrew served as 'the computer', Peter was the handler responsible for walking subjects through the trial session and Stephen was the note taker and recorder. Once the subject was seated at a clear table, Peter, working from a pre-written script, gave the subject a short introduction to our group, our class and a brief glimpse of a TimeLine itself. After this introduction, the user was provided with an article placed in our homemade browser frame. From there, each subject interacted with our 3 task modules as described above in our paper prototype summary until they discovered all of the system's functionality. Upon finishing each task Peter introduced them to the next one as the computer set things up. When the trial period was complete Stephen asked a set of follow up question we've included in the appendix.

Test Measures

Our test measures were largely:

- 1. How confused the subject appeared
- 2. The time it took a subject to interact with/understand the interface of a page
- 3. What they found most confusing
- 4. Whether they were able to complete each task without asking for hints

5. All answers to our post interview questions.

<u>Results</u>

<u>Task 1:</u>

- Everyone had a hard time figuring out they needed to press the TimeLine button
- Everyone found the summary buttons on their own, got the summaries for multiple articles and either nodded or smiled as doing so.
- Everyone managed to link to articles from the timeline on their own
- Each person tried to see one of the other two tabbed tablines (though they weren't available in our demo
- None of the users spent more than 20 seconds reading a given article once it was put in front of them.
- Q: How'd you feel about the button?
 - Pat: "Makes a lot of sense, solves same issue of in the middle of article wishing you could know more about it."
 - Jafar: "button was kind of confusing but maybe because it was my first time"
- Q: How'd you feel about the timeline?
 - Patrick: "Like idea of people doing different timelines. More creative way to use space though (instead of tabs)?"
 - Lauren: "Good way for me to just get quick background info on new topics."

Task 2:

- Everyone worked through this section very quickly
- Pat obtained his first preview and said "very cool" while Jofar noted during his trial, "Oh how easy."
- Everyone tried to tap the preview to obtain the full timelines (though they weren't available in the demo)
- Q: How'd you feel about the search window?
 - Patrick: "Unless specifically for timeline, not used as much vs top feeds."

Task 3:

Almost nothing to note in terms of user surprises

- Everyone flew through this section very quickly as well.
- Pat and Jofar immediately knew to click the circular plus button to create a new timeline. Lauren took under ten seconds as well.
- Everyone created all 3 entries back to back with no problem.
- Q: What'd you think of making a timeline?
 - Jafar: "I probably wouldn't do that...Would I go to see other people timeline? If someone professional I will view...If someone lists all news it can be biased, I wouldn't trust some random guys news article"
 - Patrick: "I think it's for certain consumers, bloggers, reddit users, I'm not one of those people."

Q: "Anything you wanted to do that you couldn't?"

 Jafar: "Can't see comments. Sometimes I go directly to comments, like to see that."

Q: "Would you find this useful?"

 Jafar: "Ya, definitely. If it's about sports I would definitely find it useful to catch up on things I've missed"

Q: "Overall thoughts?"

- Patrick: "Timelines makes sense, vs traditional news sources, contextual news is better."
- Jafar: "Really easy, liked it, the idea I can see all news in one place is really, really important"
- Lauren: "As a study tool it's a nice idea"

Discussion

Overall, our participants seemed to feel that the interface was very easy to use. There were few observable user errors save the Timeline button itself not being noticed at the beginning of two of the tests which signaled that it may have been more novel to our subjects than we initially thought it would be. Other than that, our participants sped through the search and create tasks with two of them even noting how "cool" and "easy" the processes were. From our interview results there were a few observations we found

important to take note of.

The first point was that each of our users was excited about how easy it was to be given context on a topic of interest. Jofar was thrilled at the possibility of having a way to catch up on his favorite team's sports news, Lauren was very excited about using the button to quickly learn a lot about a new topic, and Pat noted how much better he preferred this idea over traditional news which expects readers to already be informed of context. As he stated - "It's not fair to expect people will be so informed, contextual news is better." **So moving forwards** we have more confidence that providing easily digestible context to topics of interest is a service that people will be excited to have.

The next point is that users seemed to value the idea of different perspectives provided to them on a single topic by multiple Timelines. We know this from Jofar who said that he liked having multiple timelines on each article and Pat who said he liked the idea of having different perspectives on a single topic. And even at a surface level each user tried to access a second tabbed timeline (that wasn't actually available for them) telling us that if it's there they'll want to consume it. *So moving forwards* it seems like it may be important to promote timeline content that looks at a single content from different perspectives and it will be interesting to see what we can do with the design of our system to do so.

Another point is that our users were concerned about trusting the quality of any given Timeline with Jofar noting that he wouldn't trust work from strangers and Lauren noting that she would use the service for getting personal background knowledge on a topic but might think twice before citing the content in a research paper. It will be problematic for our service if we can't get anyone to read content because they don't trust it. So moving forwards we may want to delve into how companies heavily involved in sharing economies like Uber or Airbnb build trust between their users and implement a feedback system users can use to provide feedback on the success of whole timelines or even relevancy of certain articles within timelines in order promote good content and make it visible.

Stemming from this point we had two users acknowledge that they probably wouldn't generate content. Getting users to generate content seems like it will be one of our biggest challenges and deserves very close attention.

Yet Another point we noted is how much our subjects seemed to enjoy getting quick summaries of content (by pushing our "..." buttons at the bottom of each TimeLine entry). Each subject read multiple summaries of different articles before they read a full

article and spent very little time reading said full articles. On top of this, Patrick made a point to note that he thought the timelines were a fitting form of content for our generation whose attention span is minimal while Jofar noted how much he liked being able to see all the news at once by looking at a timeline. *So moving forwards*, it might be important to consider what content we display on the timeline. If quick summarizing information is as attractive as it seemed to be in our 3 initial tests, then maybe users would prefer it if we automatically displayed short summaries next to each entry instead of requiring them to perform an additional step of clicking a summary button.

Lastly, after hearing it from Patrick, we think it will be important to consider moving forwards how we want to users to discover content by topic on our homepage. Do we want to only give them a search bar or do people also want to be have the hottest topics given to them?

Here is your current list of timelines and the article url's we have available for you to build with today. So once again poke around and the computer will take care of things for you.
