"The results show clearly that we have much more work to do in battling sexual assault and sexual misconduct at Stanford. About 2 percent of Stanford students surveyed, and just under 5 percent of undergraduate women surveyed, reported experiencing an incident of sexual assault as defined by Stanford policy during their time at Stanford...

In addition, another 14 percent of students surveyed – and nearly one-third of undergraduate women surveyed – reported experiencing some other form of sexual misconduct, including non consensual touching, during their time at Stanford."

Results: Students lack knowledge of resources

- Go to Title IX office to officially report
- Can talk to SARA "thing"
- House staff, bridge, caps, vaden
- Administrators give students who report a handout of resources available for mental health issues, but nothing particular
- ➤ Would go to close friends to discuss, not sure if they would report

"Lack of control after reporting"


"Wouldn't do it unless it was the exact steps I wanted to take"
