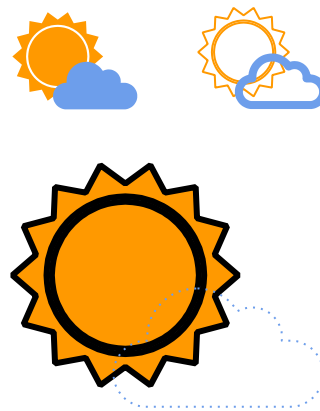
SlidesCarnival icons are editable shapes.
